


• The Climate Action and Low Carbon Development Act (2015), as amended in 2021, requires that the Climate Change Advisory Council shall advise and provide recommendations to a Minister in respect of "sector specific actions, within his or her responsibility, which are to be included in the climate action plan", "the preparation of a national adaptation framework" and "the making by him or her of a sectoral adaptation plan".


Ireland's Climate Change Policy Cycle from CCAC Perspective




Annual Oversight from CCAC/Oireachtas

Current Targets

Based on provisional estimates of emissions reported for 1990–2022, emissions in Ireland have largely rebounded from the impact of COVID-19 restrictions. Emissions in 2022 were just 2.7% below 2018 levels having reduced by a modest 2% relative to 2021.

Planning

Reforms and resourcing of planning, licensing and regulatory systems.

Challenge to achieve the level of investment, particularly in infrastructure, required to reduce emissions at pace required.



Finance

Funding for adaptation from departments, regulators and local authorities along with investment from the private sector.

Green financing solutions to assist homeowners and businesses to access longer-term low-cost rates.



Long Term Climate Action Strategy

Need for a long-term vision for Ireland.

Analysis of potential scenarios and pathways by which Ireland may achieve its climate objectives.
